National Wildlife Refuge Hunting Regulations 2022–2023



Welcome

Muscatatuck National Wildlife Refuge was established in 1966 along the Vernon Fork of the Muscatatuck River "...for use as an inviolate sanctuary, or for any other management purpose, for migratory birds" The refuge mission is to restore, preserve, and manage a mix of forest, wetland, and grassland habitat for fish, wildlife and people. More than 280 species of birds have been seen at Muscatatuck, and the refuge is recognized as a "Continentially Important" bird area.

Firearms

Persons possessing, transporting, or carrying firearms on National Wildlife Refuge System lands must comply with all provisions of State and local law. Persons may only use (discharge) firearms in accordance with refuge regulations (50 CFR 27.42 and specific refuge regulations in 50 CFR Part 32.)

Vehicles

Licensed motor vehicles are permitted only on public use roads. ATV and UTVs are prohibited.

Hunting and Fishing Regulations

Hunting and fishing regulations are designed to provide safe recreational opportunities through wise use of renewable wildlife resources. Hunting and fishing are permitted in accordance with Federal regulations governing public use on National Wildlife Refuges as set forth in Title 50 of the Code of Federal Regulations.

Access

Hunters may only access the Refuge from 1 hour before sunrise to one hour after legal sunset.

Hunters may park in designated parking areas or along roadsides so long as no part of the vehicle is in the road. Blocking trails or levees is prohibited.

Big Game

Draw Hunts: Youth Turkey, Spring Turkey (first six days), Deer muzzle loader and youth Deer hunts are by Draw only. Hunters can apply on the Indiana DNR website: www.in.gov/dnr/fishwild/

Stands: All stands, blinds, or platforms must be removed daily.

Weapons and ammo : Deer can only be hunted with archery equipment and muzzle loader rifles. During youth deer season, hunters may use state approved firearms for public lands. Only non toxic shot can be used for Turkey hunting.

Migratory Bird/Upland Game and Small Game

- Blinds must be removed daily.
- Dogs may be used and must be under control of the handler at all times.

Muscatatuck Hunting Permit 2022—2023

When signed and carried, this serves as your permit for all refuge hunts and acknowledges your understanding of the regulations contained herein.

Expires July 31, 2023

Signature (permits are not transferable)

Prohibited Activities

- Trail cameras are prohibited
- Tree stands, platforms, & portable blinds must be removed daily
- Use of lights to locate game on the refuge is prohibited
- Use or possession of alcohol is prohibited
- Use or possession of plastic flagging or reflective tacks is prohibited
- Cutting trails or trimming trees is prohibited
- Commercial guiding or participating in a paid commercial hunt is prohibited.
- Taking or harassing any animal other than those authorized to hunt is prohibited

Signs and Boundaries

Please respect the following signs:

- No vehicles: All Traffic prohibited
- Parking area Designated areas to park while hunting

Muzzleloader Deer	2 deer per day - 1 buck and 1 doe Or 2 does	Dec. 3 – Dec. 18, 2022	Draw only May use military/refuge license
Deer Youth	2 deer per day - 1 buck and 1 doe Or 2 does	Sep. 24 & 25, 2022	Draw only May use military/refuge license
Spring Turkey	1 bearded or male turkey	State season	Draw only first six days (Ends at 1 p.m. each day) Non-toxic shot only
Youth Turkey	1 bearded or male turkey	State season	Draw only (Ends at 1 p.m. each day) Non-toxic shot only
Red and Gray Fox	None	Oct. 15, 2022 – Feb. 28, 2023	Non-toxic shot only in shotguns. Rim fire rifles allowed
Striped Skunk	None	Oct. 15, 2022 – Mar. 15 2023	Non-toxic shot only in shotguns. Rim fire rifles allowed
Raccoon & Opossum	None	Nov. 8, 2022 – Jan. 31, 2023	Non-toxic shot only in shotguns. Rim fire rifles allowed
Coyote	None	See Refuge deer hunt dates	Coyote hunting by permitted deer hunters only.
Gray and Fox Squirrel	5	Aug. 15, 2022 – Jan. 31, 2023	Non-toxic shot only in shotguns. Rim fire rifles allowed
Rabbit	5	Nov. 1, 2022 – Feb. 28, 2023	Non-toxic shot only in shotguns. Rim fire rifles allowed
Quail	8	Nov. 1, 2022 – Jan. 10, 2023	Non-toxic shot only in shotguns. Rim fire rifles allowed
