



TRAVELING WITH YOUR PET

Know before you go!



Is my pet a protected species?

Do you have travel plans coming up and want to bring your pet with you? Your pet might be a protected species! Most exotic pets are protected under the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES). CITES combats wildlife trafficking and ensures that international trade in animals and plants does not threaten their survival in the wild. Your pet bird may also be protected under the Wild Bird Conservation Act (WBCA). Prepare ahead of time and check if your pet is listed under CITES at www.speciesplus.net.

Important!

Make sure to apply well in advance of your travel. Please allow **60-90 days** for processing your permit application.
