

Skippers have smaller bodies and more triangular shaped wings than other butterflies. This has earned them the distinction of being likened to the jet planes of the butterfly world.

Not only do skippers look like miniature jet planes, they are alo the fastest of butterfly families, clocking in at speeds of over 20 mph!

Adult Carson wandering skippers fly for just a few weeks in the month of June. Adults spend this time nectaring on local flowers, mating, and then laying eggs on saltgrass.
